

Shoji Ueda Sand Dune













Shoji Ueda (1913-2000) was one of Japan's most prominent modernist photographers and continues to be one of the nation's most highly regarded. Working mostly in his home prefecture of Tottori, he frequently incorporated surrealist imagery into his photographs. He often worked with members of his family as subjects with the local landscape of sand dunes as a backdrop.

Benrido has selected six of Ueda's most cherished images to include in this finely printed collotype portfolio. These six pictures are seminal works from his series *Sand Dune*.



In 1997, Kawauchi won the Grand Prix in the photography category of the 9th Hitotsubo Exhibition (now 1_WALL), and the following year held a solo exhibition, *Utatane*, at Guardian Garden in Tokyo. The 1998 solo exhibition of the same name, featured a series of photographs that became the forerunner of her first book, *Utatane* (2001). Many of the photographs exhibited and made during that period were never included in the book and have since not been released to the public. In this mini-portfolio, Kawauchi has selected six of these works from her 1998 solo exhibition to be realised as collotype prints. The works, a starting port of Kawauchi's career, offers a glimpse to the foundations of her unique visual language.



Nakaji Yasui The Photography of Nakaji Yasui













Nakaji Yasui (1903–1942) was one of the most prominent photographers in the first half of the 20th century in Japan. He started the New Photography movement with his colleagues from the Kansai district and left an indelible impression on the pre-war age of modernist photography working in many different styles from pictorialism to photomontage.

Even though he was one of the leading figures in Japanese photography, especially in relation to the larger sphere of the fine arts, few original prints by Yasui are in existence today. These photographs were originally published in 1942, the year that Yasui died. Considering this is the last book Yasui released at a time when many materials were in short supply because of Japan's war effort, original copies are exceptionally hard to come by. This collotype portfolio includes six of the photographers' most well-known works.

Yasumasa Morimura offers his 1984 series of still-lifes *Barco Negro on a Table* as a collection of five collotype prints. The title of the series comes from the Portuguese folk song Barco Negro performed by Amalia Rodrigues, a favourite of Morimura. His interpretation includes still lifes taken on a table in his studio, where everyday objects such as tableware and clothing are elevated to a higher realm of visual sophistication.







Suda Issei (1940–2019) began his career in 1967 as a stage photographer and documentarist of the avant-garde theatre group Tenjo Sajiki, a theatrical troupe directed by poet-playwright Terayama Shuji, later working as a free-lance photographer in 1971. His works capture a subtle tension between the ordinary and extraordinary, embodying a sense of mystery in his depictions of the unusual in everyday life. For this special edition of collotype prints, six images were selected in collaboration with Issei Suda's wife Yoshiko Suda from his series *Monogusa Syui* and *Minyo Sanga*.

Masahisa Fukase Raven Scenes

With the support of the Masahisa Fukase Archives a selection of eight images have been made available as editions from the series *Raven Scenes*.

Raven Scenes was taken with a 35mm colour positive film in Kanazawa, Japan in 1977-78. Originally titled *Karasu-kei* (Landscape with Ravens), the series was first published in the June issue of Camera Mainichi, 1978 under the title *Ravens 4*.

"I was previously surprised by the bird's glowing eyes in *Ravens 3* which was published in the January issue of Camera Mainichi in 1978, but this time with the colour photographs, I was surprised by the colour of the sky. Whilst shooting in Kanazawa I had to increase the ASA from 200 to 1600 and due to the light coming from behind, as well as the rainy and cloudy weather, the sky's colour became strange and could not be predicted such as grey, green, light blue and so on. The Ravens' eyes glow brighter when they are captured from a further distance with telephoto lens and flashlights. I was about 30 to 50 meters away from them."

With the support of the Masahisa Fukase Archives, a selection of work from the series *Color Approach* are now available as editions for the first time. In 1962, Fukase was commissioned by Camera Mainichi magazine to illustrate the opening pages of its June to December issues with a series of colour images. He set about the task enthusiastically, producing numerous photomontages in differing tonalities. He described his motivation as follows:

"Surrealism's legacy is found throughout art and poetry as a whole, and even in the fields of design and film, but it scarcely features in photography apart from in some of Man Ray's work. This notion is what inspired me to create this series."

"As I'm a photographer my protagonists are always those objects in my line of sight, but my brain is not content solely with what my eyes can see, which is why, at present, I'm experimenting with complex operations, such as the superimposition of several negatives, multiple exposures, the creation of blurred effects by deliberately slowing down the shutter speed, or even by holding my camera in the air without looking through the viewfinder. One might refer to it, somewhat daringly, as automatic writing — an attempt at expressing synchronicity or the different strata of existence."

Candida Höfer White Bench & Highrise

Born in Eberswalde, Germany in 1944, Candida Höfer attended the Kunstacademie Düsseldorf from 1973 to 1982. Whilst there she studied film with the Danish filmmaker Ole John and photography under the influential photographers Bernd and Hilla Becher, who also taught noted Düsseldorf School photographers Andreas Gursky, Thomas Struth, Axel Hütte and Thomas Ruff.

Known for her meticulously composed, large-scale colour images of architectural interiors, Höfer's oeuvre explores the structure, presentation, and influence of space.

Whilst devoid of people, the images allow us to consider the role of their missing inhabitants and invites the viewer to linger over the architectural details and contemplate the subtle shifts in light that make up the character of the space. For this special edition Höfer has selected two images from her recent body of work to be produced in collotype.







Kenro Izu (b. 1949) created his *BLUE* series as an homage to Spanish painter Pablo Picasso's works from the Blue Period (1901–1904).

With a lifetime passion for the art of printmaking, Izu has developed a distinct reputation as one of the best Platinum/Palladium print-makers in the world. He printed the series by cyanotype over platinum prints, but due to the technical difficulties of the process he was only able to produce a very limited number of editions.

With Benrido, the series has been revisited with the depth of the colour blue and fine tonal gradations created through the collotype process, presenting a new layer to experiencing Izu's meditative and serene compositions.



ANIMA | Photographed at the national burial ground located near Washington, D.C., these animals are among the few left to perform a duty for mankind that dates back centuries. No longer used in warfare, they now have the sole privilege of accompanying soldiers to their final resting place. "As I spent time with them at night I felt this was maybe one of the most intimate and private moments to witness: the gap between wakefulness and slumber, a space for dreaming and reverie." – Charlotte Dumas

Stay | "In November 2014 I started portraying the native horses of Japan such as the Kiso horse, a breed that was almost wiped out on orders of the old Imperial Army during the Meiji era (1868-1912). All but one of the eight breeds remain in very low numbers. Confined to small islands most breeds have never been able to migrate. In some cases they have become the emblem of their location like the Yonaguni horse of the small Southern island of Japan." — Charlotte Dumas

Antony Cairns' (b. 1980) limited edition collotype prints of his LDN EI series presents images of his city of birth, London. Traditionally trained as a photographer at the London College of Printing, his photographic practice has remained rooted in chemical-based techniques, often experimenting with forgotten or discarded methods. In 2015 Cairns was the recipient of the 2015 Hariban Award Grand Prize and exhibited as part of the 2016 Kyotographie International Photography Festival. This edition includes 12 collotype prints produced by the master artisans of Benrido Atelier and is available individually and as a complete set.

Tokyo Rumando (b. 1980, Tokyo) began photography in 2005. Most of her staged photographs are of herself, raising questions regarding identity. She also does her own performances using various media. Rumando is known for her series *Rest 3000~ Stay 5000~*, in which she immersed herself in the world of love hotels around Tokyo, and *Orphée*, which she transformed herself into different characters linked to her past in front of a mirror. Her works have been exhibited worldwide, including the group exhibition *Performing for the Camera* at Tate Modern in 2016.

"I have previously collaborated with different men – classic car owners, Rakugo performers, performance artists – sometimes we photographed in their spaces and sometimes we also played with body painting and so on. This time, I have created a collage series with an anonymous artist." — Tokyo Rumando

The two works from $XX \times XY$ by Rumando are her first in a new series of collages made together with an anonymous artist. With Benrido, these unique works are now available as editions in reference to Shunga (Japanese erotic Ukiyo-e) which were historically reproduced by woodblock printing.

A leading pioneer of early colour photography and one of the foremost figures of Post War photography, Saul Leiter's (1923–2013) depictions of New York have attracted a wider audience since the late 1990s. Known for his painterly and distinctive use of framing and colour, his photographs abstract the ordinary, transforming people and objects into the colours, shapes and figures that painted a reinterpretation of life in New York City.

Now known to have been an admirer of Nabis and Impressionists, as well as having been an accomplished painter himself, his otherwise unknown sensitivity for Japanese art has only just recently emerged. With the support of the Saul Leiter Foundation, the Benrido artisans have printed eight images which were selected by Saul before his passing in November 2013. This specially made portfolio is an embodied realisation of an artist's work and passion that combines the personal nature of Saul's photographs and the human touch inherent in the collotype process.





Yamamoto Masao Collotype Portfolio







Yamamoto Masao (b. 1957) was trained as an oil painter before turning to photography. With his portraits, landscapes and still lifes he tries to capture the harmonious details of life that we often miss and unexpected moments of reality that look almost unreal. Benrido collaborated with the artist to make a limited edition portfolio which contain three colour collotype prints in a case handmade in Kyoto.

Yamamoto's beautiful images with delicate sensitivity seem to be his reflection on memories and the passage of time. The artist made no specific comment, but provided a poem below for these subtle images:

"In the evening of autumn day, every moment fades away, nothing is permanent. Yet, things like a certain 'thought' remains vividly as a beautiful image. I do not understand the law of how certain things remain while certain things disappear and I don't want to know." — Yamamoto Masao

Stephen Gill Night Procession













This special limited edition box brings together images from Stephen Gill's (b.1971) series *Night Procession*. Known for his various photographic works in London's borough of Hackney, *Night Procession* is the artist's first body of work to be made since his move to rural south Sweden in 2014 and took him over three years to complete. Within, the artist captures nature at night, presenting an altogether stunning performance of a world lived parallel to our own. This special edition box contains eight images that have been selected by the artist and printed in collotype by master printer Osamu Yamamoto during his residency at Benrido as the Grand Prize Winner of the Hariban Award 2017. The set of prints are housed in a traditional handmade paulownia case. Each of which has been individually hand-painted and colour toned by Stephen Gill.

Hiroshi Masaki Kyoto: A Landscape Meditation















Hiroshi Masaki (b.1949, Uwajima, Japan) is a rare book dealer who keenly understands the underlying complexities and contradictions of Japanese culture. For years his presence has served as a bridge between photographers in Japan and the eyes of the rest of the world. His photographs illustrate Japanese cities and towns with shadows and light, often devoid of their inhabitants.

In this collotype portfolio he explores the organic and artificial, past and present through the lens of his camera, revealing the deep and intertwining layers of the city of Kyoto.

J.H.Lartigue Colour







Born in Courbevoie, France, Jacques-Henri Lartigue (1894-1986) began taking photographs at the early age of six. His most well known images record the fashionable French upper class society in which he was born.

From flying homemade gliders, cars, to family and friends caught jumping in mid-air, Lartigue experimented with all the newest technologies available to him from films to cameras to better preserve the world around him. A pioneer and visionary of early 20th century photography, this special portfolio comprises of six colour photographs which showcase Lartigue's world and relationships as he captured them. The photographs selected from his archive of Autochromes and Ektachromes display the brilliance of Lartigue's work, printed in colour by the master collotype printers at Benrido.



Shoji Ueda SAND DUNE





SAND DUNE series is considered to be one of the most important and popular works made by Shoji Ueda (1913-2000), a prominent figure in Japanese Photography.

The series was created in the famous Tottori sand dunes in his hometown. Using his own family members as subjects, each scene poetically combines the subjects with the background of Tottori's skies and sand dunes.

For this edition, Benrido produced two boxes with the support of Shoji Ueda Office. A regular version, containing six *SAND DUNE* works including *Papa, Mama and Children* (1949) and *Sand Dune Landscape with My Wife* (1950), and a deluxe version containing ten works and a comprehensive photobook published by Kawade Shobo Shinsha Ltd.

Designed by Editions Xavier Barral and Benrido, the portfolio contains five collotype prints produced by Benrido on Torinoko Washi paper. 

Bastiaan Woudt NUDE








Bastiaan Woudt (NL, 1987) has collected ten of his most impressive nude images that he has shot over the past years, the nude being a particular favourite subject of Woudt.

Together with Kahmann Gallery (Amsterdam) this special portfolio adds a new dimension to his work emphasising the way Woudt approaches the human body in an almost abstract way, focusing on details, juxtaposing shapes with the background or, alternately, letting them almost completely blend in with it.

The prints have a certain physicality to them, echoing their subject. The layers of pigment give them literal body, adding a weightiness to both the print and the image portrayed.



Atsushi Suwa HANGWAN









HANGWAN features four black and white collotype prints of works by Japanese artist Atsushi Suwa from his 2007 series Stereotype. Through his paintings, Suwa attempts to expand the perception of seeing. Born in Hokkaido, Japan in 1967, Suwa trained in oil painting and graduated from Musashino Art University, Tokyo in 1992. After graduating, he was nominated by the Agency for Cultural Affairs, Japan to participate in the artist-in-residence program in Spain. He was also the first Asian artist who received the top award at the 5th International Painting Competition, presented by the Fundación Barceló. His work was collected by the Benetton Collection, Venice, Fundación Barceló, Spain, the Sato Museum of Art, Tokyo, Japan, and the Yokohama Museum of Art, Japan.

These portraits of the warrior-class men who were fated to vanish amidst the tide of social change are an invaluable historical record from the Meiji era. Images of the last Shogun Yoshinobu Tokugawa by Fredrick William Sutton are also included.


